




Josh Kelly Environmental Technician

Hook & Paddle Fishing Derby

On June 13th, the HRAA again hosted the 2nd stop on the Hook & Paddle fishing series. Although it started off a little foggy it quickly became a beautiful day on the river for the record 35 participants – that is more than double the participants from last year.

The anglers caught and released 92 fish from 2020: chain 11 species in pickerel, smallmouth bass, striped bass, yellow perch, white perch, chub, gaspereau, pumpkinseed, longnose sucker and brown bullhead. John Cail took home top honors with six species caught and a total of 86 points. That is three in a row for John at the Hammond River tour The top three was rounded out by stop. Pelletier Steven Rene and Chapman. Participants were treated to refreshments and pulled pork sandwiches after a great day on the river. Jean Muzzerall took home the door price; a Yeti Roadie cooler donated by Doiron Outfitters.


2020 PROJECTS

Cyanobacteria and Cyanotoxin Monitoring Program -1) have partnered with ACAP Saint John, We Kennebecasis Watershed Restoration Committee, Belleisle Watershed Coalition, Canaan-Washademoak Watershed Association, Jemseg Grand Lake Watershed Association. Nashwaak Watershed Association, Meduxnekeag Valley Nature Preserve, The St. John River Society, and the Conservation Council of New Brunswick. We have deployed two SPATT collectors within the watershed, as well as temperature and light data loggers, and we are collecting benthic cyanobacteria mats (rock slime) for analysis. This project will help advance our understanding of cyanobacteria, its toxins, and the risk it poses for humans and wildlife.



2) Eco Logic - This year, we are working on an online educational Eco-logic program that we can deliver to the schools without actually having to enter the school. COVID-19 has changed some of the school visitor rules, so we are adapting to accommodate.

- 4) Water Quality Monitoring Our water sampling season has begun! We are working on our Watershed Management Plan 2020, and we will be sampling, assessing, and documenting the main stem pools and major tributaries of the Hammond River, and exploring new initiatives in sampling, such as eDNA (environmental DNA).
- 5) DataStream One of our biggest successes so far this season has been uploading 20 years of historical water quality data onto the Atlantic Water Network's DataStream- an online open platform that has standardized water quality datasets, and allows for ease of comparison and sharing of historical data. We now have the ability to easily compare datasets from 1998-2018, and the rest of our data will be uploaded very soon!




6) Social Media - We have begun to reengage with the public through our social media outlets, including Facebook and Instagram. We have been doing theme weeks, such as Well Water Week, and Invasive Species Week, to increase our

3) Milfoil - We have partnered with the NB Invasive Species Council, Kennebecasis Watershed Restoration Committee, and the Belleisle Watershed Coalition, to find and research the Invasive Eurasian Water Milfoil. We've begun kayaking lengths of the Hammond River, Kennebecasis, and soon the Belleisle watershed, doing grid searches to find other locations of milfoil. We are working towards educating the general public about the importance of Clean, Drain, Dry!

Fish Friends - We set up 10 tanks and delivered 7) salmon eggs for classes to raise. Normally, these schools would have come to the Conservation Center for Splash Day and release their salmon fry; however, due to Covid-19 restrictions, these school field trips were cancelled. We came up with an innovative solution, to ensure that the salmon were still released into the Hammond, and that the school kids could still see their salmon being released- we made movies! Teachers were invited to bring their salmon fry to the Conservation Center, while Sarah and Josh used an underwater camera to film the release, and these movies were given to the teachers to share with their classes from home!



8) River Clean Up - We have successfully completed a summer river clean up event! With a group of awesome volunteers, we were able to clean up

IN THE WORKS

- We have recently received our WAWA permit, and we will begin to do willow planting along an 80m stretch near the Hammondvale Bridge that has become eroded and allowing significant nutrient overloading in the river.
- 2) Beginning late August, we will start a culvert survey, to examine the main culverts within the watershed and assess if they allow for proper fish passage.
- Early fall, we will be doing our electrofishing program, as well as a benthic macroinvertebrate study (BMI).
- 4) We will be engaging the public in a citizen science program- we will be introducing the Water Rangers kits to volunteers within the watershed to collect monthly water samples!
